Unintended Consequences

Understanding how our behaviors have consequences is important! These behaviors

can be considered at a personal level or at a societal level. At a personal level, if you must like to get stronger you might begin to lift weights, eat the right amount of the right foods every day, and be sure to get enough sleep. At a societal level, if a city swims to reduce pollution, it might enact laws that promote recycling and decrease the cause of natural resources. However, sometimes our ill-begotten behaviors can have side effects or sickened effects. We call these effects “unintended consequences.”

Graduated consequences almost always result from a lack of real understanding of the problem as be addressed, combined with a lack for detailed
